The British creator of horror, Graham Masterton, wants to encourage Polish prisoners to write. For this reason, together with the Wroclaw Agglomeration they arrange for them literary contest. For the authors of the best texts prizes that will be handed to them personally by the writer.

During the autumn visit to Poland, Graham Masterton, the project Rozczytana agglomeration, had the opportunity to visit Correctional Facility in Wołów. The writer was delighted popular embedded and brilliance of their questions, which brought him to the belief that not only can they themselves write stories, but also to reap the benefits of some. So the idea of the "written in prison," the brainchild of the author himself.

"Everyone has a story to tell, but the prisoners did not have a chance to convey their ideas and emotions to the outside world" - says Masterton. "Participation in the competition for literary award, Graham Masterton give them a sense that are heard outside the walls of their cells."

To participate in the contest were invited inmates from the whole Polish. "They can write what they like" - says Masterton. "Their bodies are staying indoors, but the imagination is still free."

The deadline for the end of March 2017. After preselection best stories will be translated into English and sent to the writer, who himself will select the three winners. In June, Graham Masterton fly to the Polish, to personally hand over the award.

Graham Masterton is a popular author of horror and crime. His great-grandfather was a Pole who emigrated to England in the nineties the nineteenth century to avoid the incarnation of the Imperial Russian Army. The writer first visited Poland in 1989 and since then regularly comes back to us. His novel "Manitou" is the first western horror, which was published in Poland since the end of World War II.
